Meeting Purpose & Overview

- Goal: To introduce the Waterfall Center, explore bioregional assets, challenges, and visions, and gather community input for future planning.
- Focus: Identify bioregional needs, strengths, gaps, partners, and the Waterfall Center's potential role.

Key Themes from Discussions

Strengths & Opportunities

- Community Resilience & Engagement: Strong civic ties, mutual support, rich cultural and spiritual life.
- **Diversity:** Ecological, cultural, spiritual, and agricultural diversity seen as regional strengths.
- Geographic Advantage: Proximity to NYC/Albany supports tourism, agriculture, and education.
- Education: Involvement of SUNY Cobleskill, local schools, and youth programs.
- Tourism & Natural Resources: Agrotourism, recreation, landscapes, and biodiversity contribute to local vitality.

Weaknesses & Threats

- Infrastructure Gaps: Limited broadband, childcare, housing, transportation, and healthcare.
- Economic & Social Concerns: Farmer disenfranchisement, declining ag education, and reduced federal support (e.g., USDA, SNAP).
- Environmental Issues: Climate change, resource mismanagement, untreated sewage, and weak land use planning.
- **Governance & Representation:** Need for better planning, inter-agency coordination, and legislative education on rural/ag issues.
- Community Inclusion: Lack of diversity and representation from a wide range of community voices.

Visions for the Future

- A comprehensive bioregional plan inclusive of diverse voices.
- Greater community engagement and education.
- Stronger support for farmers, regenerative ag, and economic sustainability.
- Improved local services: healthcare, childcare, housing, energy, and transportation.
- Continued convenings and outreach for inclusive bioregional dialogue.

Recommendations for Outreach

- Public Sector: Local government officials, planners, state/federal agencies (e.g., DEC, USDA, EPA).
- Education: Schools, FFA, SUNY Cobleskill, other regional colleges.
- Private & Nonprofits: Chambers of commerce, farm orgs, museums, arts, tourism, builders, and healthcare orgs.
- Community Groups: Faith-based orgs, libraries, retirees, local historians, cultural orgs.

Next Steps for Waterfall Center

- Continue **convenings** and small group outreach.
- Collaborate on funding & grants with other groups.
- Help coordinate regional planning and communication.
